


## Sardinia worth to be discovered

Tour 1: Torre dei Corsari, Casa del Poeta, S'Enna de S'Arca, Pistis, Marceddì, S'Ena Arrubia



The beach **Pistis** is together with the beach **Golden Sands** of **Torre dei** 

**Corsari**, one of the most beautiful and characteristic landscapes of all Sardinia, a large golden expanse, with fine sand, compact and abundant. The action of the mistral has pushed large amounts of sand inland, **Holocene coastal sandy deposits**, forming high golden dunes that give the beach a wild and desert look

**S'Enna 'e s'Arca** is a rugged and rocky cove, with stones with bizarre shapes and sandstones carved by the wind and waves. Behind the beach, round hills rise covered with a mantle of Mediterranean scrub, which creates contrast with the green of the sea, the rocky bottom, of medium depth, very clean and clear, of a green color changing depending on the height of the sun.

From the genetic point of view, the pond of **Marceddì** occupies a Wurmian paleovalley carved by the Sitzerri river and partially filled by floods, black mud and pond peat, and subsequently invaded by the sea. Before being invaded by the sea it was a single river valley, today Marceddì is one of the most fishy lagoons on the island. The entire complex of the valley of Marceddì was included in 78, in the list of wetlands of international importance provided by the Ramsar Convention , among the "coastal areas of significant botanical interest in the drafting of the Landscape Plans of Sardinia", and in the "system of areas of botanical interest for the preservation of the floristic biodiversity of Sardinia".

**S'Ena Arrubia** Pond The pond of S'Ena Arrubia is what remains of the large stagnal and lagoon complex of Sassu, of which it is the part not reclaimed. The area of the sandy shoreline constitutes a depression of back beach formed in the Holocene as a result of the closure of the paleoalveo of the Rio di Mogoro. The pond is included among the biotopes of significant vegetational interest worthy of conservation in Italy, among the "coastal areas of significant vegetational interest in the drafting of the Landscape Plans of Sardinia" (Camarda, 1989), in the "system of areas of botanical interest for the preservation of the floristic biodiversity of Sardinia"). AVIFAUNA: Cormorant, Sgarza ciuffetto, Egret, Great Heron, Heron, Flamingo, Marsh hawk, Royal Harrier, Osprey, Pilgrim, Voltolino, Knight of Italy, Avocet, Partridge, etc. AMPHIBIANS: Emerald toad, Sardinian tree frog. REPTILES: Water tortoise, Country lizard, Gongilo ocellato, Biacco.

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
